Thanks to a partnership with Lane <u>County</u> Public Health Department, 114 adults without health insurance (Lane students, family members and some Lane employees) received Tdap immunizations April 10 and the week of April 15. Lane County Health Nurse Heather Young, who is a Lane nursing graduate and former Lane English as a Second Language teacher, coordinated the clinic with assistance and coordination from ESL staff and Lane's Student Nurses Association. They administered 90 immunization in the evening at Downtown Campus and 24 on Main Campus during the day. ESL teacher Indira Bakshi said English as a Second Language teachers included activities related to the

immunization in their English Language/Civics classes. The immunization, for most students unaffordable at \$40, is important to reduce the incidence of whooping cough, especially in babies. The clinic was possible thanks to a grant the Health Department received to provide the immunizations to uninsured adults.

Lane Community College is joining the Earth System Science Education Alliance (ESSEA; <u>http://essea.strategies.org/</u>). Lane is the organization's first community college member and the first higher education institution in Oregon to join. Paul Ruscher, the new coordinator for the Watershed Science Technician program and lead faculty for the Earth and Environmental Sciences discipline, has brought the national group to our campus as a means of improving access to curriculum materials across the sciences. These materials have been developed by teachers as outgrowths of work funded by federal agencies such as NOAA, NASA, USGS, the Department of Energy and the National Science Foundation. In addition, Lane will also become the third Oregon partner for the GLOBE program (<u>http://www.globe.gov/</u>) in 2013. GLOBE is an international hands-on environmental education program for students and teachers of all ages, which Ruscher has been involved in for 15 years. These organizations will provide opportunities for local teachers to participate in K-16 teacher professional development training opportunities in Earth and environmental sciences.
