The ESL Advisory Committee and ESL Department had a successful scholarship fundraiser on April 24 at Ninkasi Tasting Room to earn scholarships (\$47 per scholarship) for resident ESL students who can't afford classes. They raised \$390 from pints, double the normal proceeds for such an event at Ninkasi, plus more than \$1,500 from cash, check, credit card, and online contributions both at and after the event with contributions still coming in.

Ninkasi said it was one of the most successful Pints-for-a-Cause events they have ever had. 

SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CENTER:

In July 2013, a local unemployed businessman, Phil Arnold, came to the Lane Small Business Development Center (SBDC) with a startup concept for a dust free sand-blasting service. Arnold's Mobile Dustless Media Blasting, a mobile graffiti and paint removal service, is unique to Eugene and just one of three throughout Oregon. Phil approached the Lane SBDC for advice on a business plan, loan acquisition and marketing, after he realized he would need roughly \$40,000 to start the business. The entrepreneur met with Larry Reed, Lane SBDC advisor/instructor for the Start, Run and Grow Your Business program. According to Larry, Phil was motivated and proactive in moving through the program and completing his business plan. Larry suggested that Phil go with a state lending program called Entrepreneurial Development Loan Fund (EDLF), which provides direct loans to help startups, micro-enterprises and small businesses expand or become established in Oregon. The loan application was submitted in early September and by early October the loan was approved and closed. In January 2014, a specialized built-to-order truck was completed and the business was up and running.
