Fifteen Lane Students Earn Prestigious Scholarships

The Ford Family Foundation based in Roseburg, Oregon awarded a total of 15 scholarships to Lane Community College students. The scholarship will pay up to 80 percent of a student's unmet financial need—up to \$25,000 per year. Some Ford scholarships will also pay for graduate education.

Ford Foundation staff said that about 6,000 students applied for the Foundations' four scholarships this year. Students submit an application that requires them to respond to challenging essay questions. Those who make the initial cut participate in a 30-minute interview with a three-person panel consisting of community volunteers. Mary Parthemer of TRiO offered an interview workshop to prepare students. Successful Ford Family Foundation recipients attended to tell the story of their interview experiences. Fifteen students attended the session; the majority of those who did received scholarships to Lane or their transfer university.

Lane Community College has been awarded a grant of \$618,881by the National Science Foundation (NSF) for the *Independent Learner Energy Education Design (iLEED)* project led by Energy/Water Education Programs Coordinator, Roger Ebbage.

iLEED focuses on educating community college students in energy management through the development of a novel, educational partnership with Northwest public utilities. The project will expand energy efficiency education to a wider geographic area than is currently possible due to limitations imposed by mandatory field-work. iLEED supplies highly-qualified energy management technicians to our region's commercial building sector, and provides access to high-wage, high-skill jobs to a broader demographic of students.

iLEED introduces a new method of career technical educational content delivery to the industry, which will reach a wider range of students than currently served by expanding online curriculum to students in rural geographic areas, or students who are not able to attend "traditional" classes

due to work and/or family obligations.

The program is motivated by 1) the high demand for energy management workforce by industry; 2) the need for a novel education method which will expand reach to broader student populations, and 3) Lane Community College's expertise in energy management programs and experience delivering quality programs outside the traditional campus environment. The project builds off of Lane Community College's NSF funded *LANES* grant which put energy management coursework online, while partnering with other community colleges across the nation for the field-work component.

To increase participation for a wider sector of potential students, and to cover a broader geographic range, iLEED will modify the existing online coursework developed through *LANES*, and then couple it with field-work experiences through regional public utilities. With this model of higher education/ industry partnership, energy management students will be served regardless of their geographic location, work-schedule, or family obligations. This opens opportunities to student demographics that are currently unavailable.

"Our program is very pleased to have been awarded this NSF grant. This is not just taking a program online, rather, we have the potential to revolutionize how career technical programs serve underserved populations. Through this innovative instructional method we expect to increase the Energy Management program's enrollment and consequently that of Lane Community College," said Ebbage.

The key tasks of the grant are as follows:

- Develop a communication application between Lane, Utilities, and students
- Develop a handbook and training webinar for utility-mentors
- Curriculum Development
- ° Align fieldwork activities for remote implementation
- ° Create digital cooperative education course
- Provide on-going support to utility mentors
- Develop and implement student pre-enrollment assessment
- Faculty deliver Energy Management curriculum and assess student work
