


Academic Learning Skills writing instructor and author Steve McQuiddy presented in San Francisco at the iconic City Lights Books on Oct. 15 as part of the city-wide literary celebration, Litquake. His book published by Oregon State University Press, "Here on the Edge," tells the story of how a small group of World War II conscientious objectors plowed the ground for the social and cultural revolutions of the 1960s. Coming on the heels of being named a finalist for the \$10,000 Dayton Literary Peace Prize, McQuiddy put together a panel discussion featuring two members of the camp profiled in his book -- both now in their 90s. An audience representing four generations packed the historic room for a two-hour conversation featuring memories, observations, and commentary on the complex issues of war and peace in our society.

This four hour seminar focussed on the diagnosis of Toyota/Lexus engine performance problems. Attendees who included students in Lane's Automotive Technology program received a comprehensive diagnostic manual to supplement the case study exercises.

On November 11, 2014, approximately twenty people from the local business community and the College attended a free presentation on 3-D Rapid Prototype Technologies sponsored by The Society of Manufacturing Engineers (SME) Chapter 423 and the Advanced Technology Division.

Daniel Searle, Business Development Manager, from Solid Concepts presented "Additive Manufacturing, Changing the Future of Product Development and Manufacturing through 3D Printing." He covered the fundamentals of rapid prototyping (3D printing) and how additive manufacturing can help designers create better products faster and for less cost. He also discussed how large and small companies are utilizing additive manufacturing (AM) to gain the advantage of getting the right product to market faster than competitors, and finally showed how manufacturing engineers are utilizing AM and other technologies to create jigs and fixtures, check gauges and low volume end use parts.

There was a special highlight on Direct Metal Laser Sintering (DMLS) which makes 3D parts with nearly perfect density using 17-4 Stainless Steel and Inconel 625. DMLS is used for prototypes and end use parts.



Anne McGrail got a second NEH grant for \$88,778, for "Bringing the Digital Humanities to the Community College and Vice Versa." The purpose of the grant is to address this lag in Digital Humanities (DH) at community college. Lane plans to host an institute July 13-17, 2015 that will enable faculty to learn DH theory and methods, build DH tools and projects and scaffold these for the unique learning needs of their students. The institute will expand the definition of digital humanities practice to include the work of community college teachers, scholars and students. The 25 participants will emerge with a firm grounding in the depth and complexity of DH and its applicability to their courses. They will create a portfolio of project prototypes in data visualization, geospatial mapping, crowdsourcing, and digital storytelling, et al. To extend the reach of the institute, a public keynote address will welcome the community into the DH conversation, and participants' work will be shared in an online commons that will serve as a hub for developing a community of practice.
