Both Heath and I have worked on important issues this past year as board members for the Oregon Student Association advocating for students across Oregon. I am one of the Co-Chairs for the Oregon Students of Color Coalition, and have sat on the steering committee for the OSCC Conference that had over 500 students last November at Lane Community College, I have testified/lobbied at our state capital for Cultural Competency, Increasing state funding to our colleges and Access to Opportunity, and continuing to fight for our student community. As President, I will use my role as a resource and advocate for students, I believe that this role is here to represent students that often times aren't being represented on our campus that includes non-traditional people: students with

disabilities, international & undocumented students, low-income, first-generation, LGBTQ+ and students of color. There needs to be a stronger voice, I can be that voice. I believe in Rising for Justice, Acting for Students, and Winning Education.

Our priorities for 2015-2016 include but are not limited to:

- Tuition & Affordability The cost of higher education is expensive, and a barrier for many students, we want to continue to keep working towards making sure that students aren't profit centers. We will do this by demanding: state funding from our legislatures in Salem, textbook affordability, and exhausting every possible option to ensure that programs do NOT get cut, and our tuition that is at \$99.50 gets capped. No more cuts and no more fees.
- Improve accessibility for students with disabilities in the areas of housing, facilities, and academic support Our campus is really inaccessible to the disabled community and I want to work on expanding resources to people that come to LCC whether that is students or Lane employees.
- Advocate for gender-neutral bathrooms to accommodate members of the LGBTQ+ community
 Gender-neutral bathrooms are a necessity to many students
- Implement a sexual assault prevention program that widely educates all student groups on bystander intervention procedures
- Create and popularize an effective mentorship program for spring admits and transfer students
- Advocate for Queer Studies program in the social science department
- Continue to hold administrators and student government accountable by having open forums
- Advocate for the expansion of cultural resource centers
- Food Justice, Environmental Social Justice and Sustainability
- Creating safe spaces on and off campus
- Bridging high school students with Lane Community College and local universities

I'm using that degree to go to law school. Both of us believe in the intimate relationship between environmental stewardship and intergenerational justice, one that we will focus on throughout this next year learning how to make Lane a better place to learn.

We are convicted that we can change our communities with a solution based responsive approach to issues on campus and we plan to organize students around very personal but deeply felt issues for everyone at Lane; Access to Education and Injustice in Our Communities.

The majority of people at Lane understand the struggle of student life and the burden of increasing expenses while going to school. It is already too expensive and then there are additional costs and fees, books and software keys, that we have to pay for out of pocket. Deferred billing traps us into spending money in the wrong ways, not by our choice but because of limited options. We will level the playing field and eliminate outrageous required classroom material fees for students by expanding options and improving access.

We will first approach these issues with three focuses;

Instructor Trainings such as cultural competency and Utilizing open educational resources, An OER/\$avings Identification Indicator on classes in the Term Course Catalog for students to practice savvy selection while scheduling, and Proving results with videos of weekly ASLCC Senate to exemplify that OERs are a practical and accessible alternative to the books that are causing us to choose between eating and having phone service every term because of the price.

We will address these issues with a practical and responsive year long plan.

Fall term, we will expand Open Educational Resources (free textbooks) through the Open Con Coalition Conference(The Right to Research), working with the OSU Open Access Initiative and the State Wide OER Librarian to bring free options to classrooms near you. We will lead the way on the groundwork for policy development and implementation of OERs at Lane. Back to back we will be taking an approach that builds community working with teachers and students and at

the same time maintain a strong, robustly urgent voice in the halls of our Legislature. These means we need to have consistent representation in our governance system. Here at Lane students have a history of spearheading and changing our communities and therefore we have the respect of decision makers on campus. Our Voice matters. We need to have the right students in those seats all year long and we have already payed the way. We need to continue the community legacy. To address injustice and violence in our communities and organize to confront systems of oppression we will facilitate "Know Your Rights" Study Groups each term. These groups will prioritize success and readiness by devoting the first 5 minutes to each study session to hand out KYR pamphlets and reviewing them collectively. Winter Term, we will team up with our community to provide martial arts self-defense trainings and "Brave Spaces" for people to talk privately about widely felt issues that hinder our success as students. By Spring, we will have saved students money and increased our students' success for accessing resources when they need help. Between the access that is promised by OERs and the empowerment of knowing our rights and becoming your own advocate while linked up around a common goal such as getting good grades, we believe that our approach will result in an awakened, responsive community that stands up for justice for all. Our community will stand out for Justice by knowing our rights and by having access to transformative information in a way we **determine.** This year we will bring people together because it takes a community to raise a generation of graduates and successful citizens. We will fight for "Intergenerational" justice and train for community self-defense. We will empower students to use their voices proudly when exercising their rights. We will save students money and make participation and awareness achievable for all students. In times of need, we will respond to our community and be the voice that says what needs to be said and accomplish what needs to be done. "Pray not for lighter burdens but for stronger backs" -Anon. Vote for Ashley Jackson and Jazzmen Vega, so we can lead students into the 2015-2016 year and we will continue our powerful community legacy for us and the students to come after us.

Part 3: Ballot Measure

Shall the Student Activity fee be increased \$1.70 to provide funding for the ASLCC operating budget, food pantry, and to expand travel and training opportunities for students at large?

"Yes" Vote means:

The Student Activity Fee will increase from \$54.30 to \$56.00. This funding will be utilized by the ASLCC to increase supplies to the Rainy Day Pantry when needed, to pay for additional travel and conference costs for students to attend leadership development conferences.

"No" Vote means:

The Student Activity Fee will not increase.
