Course Description (1000 character limit):

This course is for students who want to build on their skills for credit on an intermediate level. Different projects will be assigned each term the course is taught, so students repeating the course will develop new skills and learn new structures and techniques. An artist book differs from a typical book in that the book is not merely a container for art, but is designed, conceived and created by the artist as an art form in itself. As a book artist, you are your own author, artist/illustrator, typographer, printer and binder. Artist Books are one of the few new artistic genres of the 20th century. In this course, students will learn and create variety of basic folded and stitched book structures and learn pop-up techniques. Their assigned project work will be their original artistic creations. Students will write their own texts as well as use existing or assigned text in their projects. Curriculum will focus on design process development, conceptual development and typographic layout. Each project will culminate with an in-class critique and discussion. Students will also learn historical content related to the course such as the history of the book form throughout the world, the history of movable books, artist's books and fine press books.

Have learned and assembled a variety of basic and creative book binding styles and pop-up techniques building on skills learned from the basic level class.

Have designed and created original artists books using existing written content or have written their own content according to the assignments.
