Rationale:

How does this proposal further the goals of the program or department?

This proposal helps expand the scope and offering of the LLC Division and International Programs consistent with Lane's strategic direction on Liberal Education, and expanding and enhancing international offerings. This program supports Lane's strategic intent around progression and completion through attracting talented students to the French program and engaging them in unique curricular opportunities.

What assessment evidence supports this proposal?

Research from both University of Minnesota and University of Georgia shows increased retention and graduation rates amongst study-abroad returnees. At end of program we will do assessment on impact of the program on students' goals and progression.

How do you know there is a demand for this course?

In spring and fall terms of 2011, information sessions were held on campus and many students (20-30) showed interest. It was taught as a 199 course summer of 2012. Ultimately, there were 10 students who were able to meet the application criteria and raise enough funds to be able to participate in our inaugural program during the summer of 2012. The program was very successful, and this year as we begin advertising for the summer of 2014, there has been an increasing number of students interested in learning more. Former participants are volunteering to speak about their experience in current French classes, and we have begun holding informational sessions and working with the Foundation to provide scholarships.

All students with minimal experience in studying French, regardless of proficiency level, will have an opportunity to take this course and gain exposure to the culture and language. Currently, it is the only course which allows students to explore a region where French is spoken as a native language. This

course is being created specifically in order to offer a high quality overseas program that is affordable to a broad range of students. The cost of a comparable program in the OUS system is approximately \$2,000 higher. This course will also allow learners to gain first hand international experience--a valuable asset in the competitive global marketplace.
