## **Course Description (300 character limit):**

Geography of Pacific Asia focuses on a functional world region that includes East and Southeast Asia, and the Pacific. The course has two primary components: (1) a descriptive introduction to the region focusing on processes associated with physical, human/ cultural, political, economic and environmental patterns; (2) a thematic exploration of human and physical geographic concepts with reference to these regional patterns. A substantial research component will allow students to create an annotated bibliography on a topic of regional importance.
