Topics:

Topics will include a description of the signs and symptoms of problem and pathological gambling, assessment of problem gambling according to various assessment tools including DSM criteria, distinguishing differences between chemical dependency and problem gambling, gaining knowledge of cognitive distortions of the problem gambling, learning about current research regarding problem gambling and the brain, developing strategies for treatment, including the action cycle of the gambler, reviewing special populations and gambling, working with families of problem gamblers and reviewing the history of the problem gambling treatment system in Oregon.

Rationale:

How does this proposal further the goals of the program or department?

Problem gambling is covered minimally and superficially in Human Services classes. This course would provide an in-depth study and discussion of issues specific to this addiction. There is an ACCBO (Addiction Counselor Certification Board) certification for gambling counselors, CAGC (certified addiction gambling counselor). This course would supply 10 hours of the required 60 hours for problem gambling certification.

What assessment evidence supports this proposal?

There continues to be a shortage of qualified certified mental health and addictions specialists to treat this unique addiction. A 2001 Oregon Problem Gambling Prevalence Study found a prevalence rate of 2.7% in problem gambling and probable pathological gamblers (Moore and Volberg, 2001) in the State of Oregon. From 7-1-95 to 6-30-05 over 10,500 problem and pathological gamblers were admitted to Oregon Problem Gambling treatment programs with an additional 2002 family member also enrolled into treatment. Currently in Oregon there are 29 active treatment programs run by 25 agencies. Oregon has been the leader nationally in the development and operation of gambling treatment programs.(Moore & Marotta, 2005).

How do you know there is a demand for this course?

The Oregon Statewide Problem Gambling Helpline is run by the local agency, Emergence Behavioral Health Programs. Emergence, whose program was established in 1994, also runs the only Lane County treatment program for problem gamblers. There is an ACCBO (Addiction Counselor Certification Board) certification for gambling counselors, CGAC (Certified Addiction Gambling Counselor). This course would supply 10 hours of the required 60 hours for problem gambling certification Level I and Level II.
