Sustainable Food Committee Presentation	Discussion: The Sustainable Food Committee expressed their desire for Facilities Council to support them as they locate space on campus to open a food pantry for students. They had several presenters who covered various aspects of their concerns and provided valuable information regarding the need for student assistance

	in basic needs they wish to address with the food pantry. Facilities Council was impressed with their
	information and made suggestions as to next steps for them to locate space on campus which would meet their
	needs as they grow.
Scenario Planning	Discussion: Facilities Council reported back on the various facets of drivers they reviewed. Findings:
	Community Colleges have a higher default rate than larger institutions. On average, students incur 20-30k
	debt while attending school. Recent budget sequestration will impact student loans especially non secured
	loans and Federal work student programs. The need to focus on where we have been and where we are
	headed is a major driver in the scenario planning process. Currently the state has continued to dis invest in
	higher education. Meanwhile, the population in Lane County has grown steadily over the last 20 years. The
	median age is 39. Lane CC students are a higher percent of diverse cultures than the norm. Online student
	involvement has grown from 3 million in 2002 to 90 million in 2011. Preparing for climate change in the upper
	Willamette Basin is wise. The climate is expected to become drier and the population denser significantly by
	2080. Facilities Council will be putting all the information gathered for the scenario planning on a shared drive.
