Oak Hill School Receives Active Shooter Defense Training

On 01/20/2016 Lane Community College Public Safety Officers conducted a hands on violent actor defense training class at Oakhill School. The training was requested by Oakhill staff after a "Run Hide Fight" presentation. During the presentation, an instructor asked "How do I even begin to defend myself and my class from a shooter?" The Department of Public Safety Defensive Tactics Team began carefully selecting a curriculum to satisfy the request.

The Defensive Tactics Team consists of Sgt. Ryker, Cpl. Sager, and Officer Williams. All officers on this team brought previous experience from a military, police, or martial arts background. Sgt. Ryker



serves as the lead instructor and has extensive experience in mixed martial arts, Krav Maga for law enforcement, and military tactics. During his career, Sgt. Ryker has protected celebrities, a president, and trained the police departments of other countries. Cpl. Sager holds a certification as a Rape Ag-

gression Defense (RAD) instructor in addition to his previous military and police defensive tactics experience. Officer Williams brings 8 years of martial arts experience and will attend training in February to become certified as a Krav Maga instructor for law enforcement.

The training for Oak Hill was a fast paced 3 hour crash course on selfdefense and weapons disarming. The instructors lectured on topics such as the 21 foot rule, reactionary gap, and the Observe-Orient-Decide-Act "OODA" Loop. The training quickly moved to an introduction of basic

strikes, takedowns, handgun/rifle disarms, and edged weapon attacks. The participants got to practice the techniques before preparing for the final scenario.

The students were required to disarm the violent actor. Jacob Wyatt, a Public Safety student worker, was tasked with providing a life-like attack for the students. Mr. Wyatt surprised the group by presenting a blue training gun. In the blink of an eye several participants had sprung from their seats, tackled Mr. Wyatt to the ground, and successfully disarmed the weapon. The participants passed their final scenario.

Health and Wellness Fair



January was a very busy month for Public Safety personnel as officers participated in several community outreach projects.

The first event this month was the annual Health and Wellness Fair. This event is geared towards promoting a healthy lifestyle amongst students and staff members. Public Safety Officers Williams, Bower, Hanneson, Ryker, and Speicher staffed the booth at this fair. Marleena Pearson, a C-CERT member, also volunteered at the booth.

Sgt. Hanneson gave a presentation on the new Lane Community College Hazmat Team. Sgt. Hanneson's

Cpl. Bower presented on the Campus Community Emergency Response Team (C-CERT). C-CERT is the all volunteer emergency response team charged with supplementing the personnel of Public Safety during dynamic crises. Sgt. Ryker and Officer Williams gave self-defense demonstrations every 30 minutes and invited fair attendees to learn the techniques as well. Participants could learn basic strikes, weapons disarms, leg sweeps, throws, and how to take down a larger opponent with one finger. The

(continued from page 2) During the time between their primary areas of responsibility, Cpl. Bower and Officer Williams gave a presentation on the LCC Public Safety Emergency Medical Technician Team. The EMT team is made up of nationally certified EMS professionals who can provide emergency medical care in addition to their regular patrol duties. This unique team represents a rarity among law enforcement in Oregon. Typically, sworn police officers in Oregon are only trained in the bare minimum first aid skills. Thanks to grants and other funding, the Department of Public Safety is able to provide an even higher level of care to the campus community. The officers offered free blood pressure checks to participants.



Sgt. Speicher gave a presentation on the overall services and history of the department. Sgt. Speicher is a semi-retired officer and training specialist.

Student Resource Fair


Public Safety participated in the Lane Community College Student Resource Fair. This fair is a brand new event geared towards connecting students with some of the resources offered on campus to help them be successful.

- Public Safety is the primary law enforcement agency responsible for campus.
- The majority of Public Safety Officers have previous experience as sworn law enforcement officers or have graduated from a state recognized police academy.
- Several officers are certified Emergency Medical Technicians
- Public Safety is charged with responding to all medical emergencies on campus
- Public Safety offers portable jump start packs to assist motorists with dead batteries

Safety Tip Article by R. Williams

Grain of Salt

In January, Public Safety received a number of reports of vehicle roll outs around campus. A "vehicle roll out" occurs when a vehicle is stopped in a parking space but the parking brake is not properly applied before the driver exits. If the vehicle is on any type of slope, the vehicle begins to roll out until it is stopped by a heavy stationary object, usually another vehicle. Typically the vehicle gains enough momentum to cause serious damage to whatever it eventually collides with. Please remember that Oregon Law requires that drivers properly secure their vehicle. ORS 811.585 mandates that a driver stop the engine, turn the front wheels to the curb when standing upon any slope, lock the ignition, remove the key from the ignition, and effectively set the parking brake of the vehicle. By completing all of these steps, a person can prevent a vehicle roll out and greatly reduce their personal liability for any damage a collision could cause.
