Electronic Cigarettes and Their Use on Campus

Many people know that Lane Community College has adopted a Tobacco-Free Campus Policy. What many people don't know is what that entails. Many people also do not know that they can be fined for the use of non-tobacco inhalant use. Being a tobacco-free campus means more that meets the eye. It's obvious that no one can smoke tobacco anywhere except for the four red shelters in lots B, L, M, and N.

Less obvious, tobacco-free encompasses chewing tobacco and electronic cigarettes. It is specifically electronic cigarettes which have been a source of controversy across campus. The school has decided that electronic cigarettes are also disruptive to the learning environment and are subject to the same rules as normal tobacco cigarettes, pipes, and chewing tobacco. In essence, if you are using tobacco or a tobacco substitute, you are subject to a citation unless you are in the approved smoking areas.

The fines are as follows: \$25 for the first offense, \$50 for the second, and \$100 for the third. For each offense after the third you are subject to another \$100 dollar fine plus a referral to Human Resources, your supervisor, or the Dean of Students.



Winter Weather Driving Tips

- Prepare your vehicle in advance. Brakes and steering should be in excellent working condition. Check all lights, ensure all fluid levels are topped off and tires are at proper air pressure. The fuel tank should be full. Windshield wipers should be new and functional. Ensure battery is adequate and terminals clean and free of corrosion. Washing your car increases visibility to other drivers.
- Ensure cell phones are completely charged. Add phone numbers in the address book for vehicle insurance agent, tow companies, etc. Don't forget to include emergency phone numbers.
- Equip your vehicle with an emergency kit with the following items: blanket, warm clothes, gloves, snow boots, ice scraper, first aid kit, flashlight, jumper cables, road flares, small shovel and de-icer.
- Check the weather prior to departure, keeping in mind that during the winter months, conditions may change without warning. Keep in mind that some routes, particular those going over mountain passes, may require snow tires or chains be installed on vehicle tires.
- Allow yourself extra time to get from Point A to Point B, as roads may be slick or visibility low during this time of year.
- Take your time, decrease speed even more at curves, increase distance between your vehicle and those around you. Be especially careful on bridges, overpasses and underpasses and other shady eas, which tend to be slick even when other roads are dry.
- Brake gently to avoid skidding. Also, avoid rapid acceleration, which also may cause your wheels to slip.
- Never pass snow plows or sanding trucks!
- Avoid using cruise control in *any* adverse conditions.
- Look as far ahead as possible to increase reaction time.
- Anticipate the movements of other vehicles on the road and learn to expect the unexpected.

Campus Closed?

If you've attended classes at Lane, this week, you've probably noticed the signs at the entrances that announce "College Closed". The decision as to whether or not to close campus is based on a multitude of different factors, such as conditions in and around campus, LTD bus route modifications and latest weather forecasts.

How do I know if/when campus is closed?

Every effort is made to announce campus closure or class delays by 6:30 am at the latest. In some circumstances, the determination is made the day prior if enough information is attained to make the appropriate decision. Once it is decided to close the campus, local media is notified and a Lane Alert is transmitted via text messaging and email.

To sign up for Lane Alert:

- Use MyLane or ExpressLane to access "personal information" tab in Banner.
- Click on Lane Alert Emergency Notification on Personal Information menu.
- Enter the emergency contact information you desire to be used for notification.
- Include a text contact, if available (text messages are the most dependable method for emergency and weather information).
- Once your information is entered, at the bottom of the page, click "save changes" at the bottom of the page.








Officers You Should Know
