# Some Like it *Hot!*

In June, the Public Safety Department conducting training in Aerosol Subject Restraint for officers attending the department's second Public Safety Academy. During this course, which is required for all officers to attend, students were given the option of whether or not to be exposed to the pepper spray they carry in the course of their duties. Not only did each Officer-in-Training opt to be sprayed, but two full-time veteran officers (who had been sprayed previously) volunteered to share the experience, as well.

Effects of pepper spray exposure includes eyes slamming shut, intense burning of the skin and eyes, and disorientation. Officers who experience these effects first hand are better equipped to "stay in the fight" if they are sprayed by a suspect or accidentally by fellow officers when trying to subdue a subject.

Officers who opted to be exposed to pepper spray were sprayed in the face at a distance of approx. 10'. Each officer was then required to maneuver through a series of stations, where they were instructed to perform various job-related, physical tasks, concluding with taking a suspect safely to the ground and hand-cuffing them.



# PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICERS GRADUATE RESERVE ACADEMY

#### **Officers Make it Through Grueling** Training by Sgt. Thomas

Last month, three of Lane's Public Safety Officers graduated from the Lane County Sheriff's Reserve Academy. Officer Ryan Sager, Corporal Chris Hanneson, and Corporal Lisa Rupp attended 100 hours of training with the Academy, which included courses in Oregon Law, Criminal Investigations, Investigative Report Writing, Traffic Enforcement, Use of Force, Defense Tactics. Ethics and Professionalism and Defusing Hostility, among others.

Instruction was delivered by senior law enforcement and government officials.

Other officers who completed this training returned to their home units and began their sworn work with their local agencies.

Sheriff Tom Turner, a strategic partner of the Lane Community College Public Safety Department, provided the opportunity for Public Safety officers to attend.

The training will enable officers to perform their duties with a higher degree of efficiency and professionalism. This training will ensure that members of LCC's community will receive the finest service possible.



These officers were required to change their work schedules, and to make a personal commitment to not miss any of the training during this period. These graduates, attended the Academy and performed their normal duties at Public Safety during the six-month training.

"This was a maximum effort by these officers and the entire Public Safety Department is proud of them for taking advantage of this opportunity", said Chief Jace Smith. "I hope that we can have other officers attend future academies."



## **Emergency Management Response Grows at Lane Community College**

All Public Safety officers at Lane Community College are now better prepared to respond to emergencies and disasters. A directive was recently issued requiring all officers to complete a minimum of the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Incident Command Training for Higher Education, Levels 100 and 200.

This training, that is provided online, equips officers with a foundational understanding of disaster response protocols and command structures. This in turn will enhance the overall ability of Lane's Public Safety Officers to participate in an interagency response and to appropriately support the Emergency Management Team on Campus. All members of the Command Staff are required to complete courses through the 800 level.

Officers have embraced this training and many have continued to learn far in excess of department requirements. YOUR Public Safety Department, serving YOU.

#### **30TH AVENUE TURNS DEADLY**

Two people died in two separate incidents occurring on 30th Avenue, less than two weeks apart. One victim, 18 year old Bryson Krissie, was on foot and apparently struck from behind. The other victim, 54 year old Timothy McCreary, was riding a bicycle and also struck from behind. In both cases, the drivers involved fled the scene and were arrested, later.



Please use extreme caution when walking or riding a bike along any busy street or road, especially when vehicles are operated at high speeds, such as 30th Avenue.

#### **Tips for Drivers:**

- You can encounter pedestrians or bicyclists at anytime and anywhere even in places where they are not supposed to be found.
- Pedestrians and bicyclists can be very hard to see especially in bad weather or at night. You must keep a lookout and slow down if you can't see clearly.
- When entering a crosswalk area, drive slowly and be prepared to stop.
- Stop for pedestrians who are in a crosswalk, even if it is not marked. When you stop for a pedestrian in a crosswalk, stop behind the crosswalk far enough that drivers in the other lanes can also see the pedestrian in time to stop.
- Do not overtake and pass other vehicles stopped for pedestrians.
- When you are turning, you often will have to wait for a "gap" in traffic. Beware that while you are watching for that "gap," pedestrians may have moved into your intended path.
- Be especially attentive around schools and in neighborhoods where children are active, such as Oakhill School.

#### **Tips for Pedestrians:**

- Be predictable. Stay off freeways, like I-5 and restricted zones. In fact, in Oregon, the law generally prohibits pedestrians in these areas. Use sidewalks where provided. Cross or enter streets where it is legal to do so.
- Where no sidewalks are provided, it is usually safer to walk facing road traffic.
- Make it easy for drivers to see you dress in light colors and wear retro-reflective material. It might be wise to carry a flashlight in very dark areas.
- Be wary. Most drivers are nice people, but don't count on them paying attention. Watch out make eye contact to be sure they see you!
- Alcohol and drugs can impair your ability to walk safely, just like they do a person's ability to drive.
- Use extra caution when crossing multiple-lane, higher speed streets.

#### **Tips for Bicyclists:**

- Be predictable.
- Follow the Rules of the Road as required by Oregon Law.
- Wear light or brightly-colored clothing and use lights in times of limited visibility.
- **EXPECT** that drivers will not see you and be prepared to act in order to avoid being struck.
- *Wear a helmet!* In the event that you are hit by a car, you can greatly minimize the damage and have a much better chance of surviving.

Ms. Henson completed a 40 hour course in police dispatching and holds a certification in Law Enforcement Data Systems (LEDS).







## Safety and Crime Prevention Tips For Staff

- Keep all offices and labs locked when not in use.
- Do not label keys with their purpose. Use a coding system, instead
- Keep desks, cabinets, etc. locked when not in use.
- Avoid bringing personal property to work with you.
- Petty cash should be kept to a minimum and secured in a safe place at the end of the day.
- Purses should be kept in a locked area.
- Never hang coats or jackets with valuables left in them.
- Before leaving, ensure no one is still in the room and that your area is properly secured.
- Watch out for your neighbor. If someone forgets to secure his/her property or area, keep an eye on it. If possible, secure it yourself and leave a note for your co-worker.
- Report all suspicious persons, conditions or activities immediately to Public Safety at extension 5555.
