Officers You Should Know

REPORTING OFF CAMPUS EMERGENCIES

The Public Safety Department often receives calls from students and staff regarding situations that occur off-campus, but often conclude on or near LCC property.

If you see a situation occurring off-campus that has or may result in an injury, it's extremely important to report the details to the appropriate law enforcement agency, immediately, by calling 9-1-1. Be prepared to relay information to emergency operators, including where the incident is occurring, the type of emergency (road rage incident, assault, etc.), whether or not weapons are involved and descriptions of persons and vehicles.

If an incident is happening on a roadway, it's important to provide responders with the direction in which vehicles are moving as well as cross streets and mile-post numbers or other landmarks. Try to give the operator as detailed a description of people and vehicles involved as possible.

Once 9-1-1 had been notified, remember to alert LCC Public Safety at 463-5555 (or simply 5555 on a campus phone), as well, if an incident ends up on or near our campuses.

It's critical to report incidents, such as fights, possible road rage occurrences or other situations which may result in injury to one or more persons. The quicker a call is made to emergency responders, the faster help can arrive to handle the situation.

Officer Gina Walker

Officer Walker was born in Eugene and raised in the Lane County area. She graduated from Triangle Lake High School.

Disabled LCC Cessna Lands Safely in Field

A Cessna 152 airplane piloted by a Lane Community College aviation instructor and student landed safely after losing engine power. No one was injured.

The plane landed in a field about 10 miles southwest of the Eugene airport, according to a written statement from LCC, which said one wheel came off the plane during the landing. The Federal Aviation Administration and National Transportation Safety Board were notified of the incident, LCC said, and the NTSB will investigate as per routine protocol.

LCC representatives stated that their aviation program has "an outstanding safety record of 300,000 hours with no injuries." LCC Public Safety provided support to the site.

LEAVE IT, LOCK IT OR LOSE IT!

The Public Safety Department would like to remind students and staff to ensure all valuables are secured anytime they are out of sight. This includes not only motor vehicles in the parking areas, but also personal items, such as backpacks, purses, text books, etc. Also, bicycles should be secured, with sturdy bike locks, in racks provided around campus.

If you drive a motor vehicle to school, never leave objects in view which a thief may target. Also, remember that chargers, iPod carriers, laptop bags, book bags, etc. may indicate to a thief that there may be valuable loot to be had.

Remember, it usually only takes a few seconds or so for a thief to take your stuff!

Recently, Public Safety Officers have observed and contacted many suspicious individuals in the lots, who appear to be looking for vehicles to break in to or steal. Some of these persons may be working in teams, where one person watches for officers, while another actually performs the break in. If you see suspicious activity, please report it immediately to Public Safety at 541 463-5555.

In order to enhance their skills as First Responders, several Public Safety Officers are attending LCC's EMT program.

To attend this course, officers were subjected to six separate immunizations, a complete physical, drug testing/urinalysis as well as an intensive background check.

Although these individuals attend class and labs for 11 hours per



week, plus several hours of studying and perfecting their skills on their own time, they are doing so on a strictly voluntary basis. In addition, they are still required to perform their normal shifts and duties as Public Safety Officers
