Debrief:

Future:

- Need more vendor tables

- Do tire filling station again. Have more advertising and signage. Make sure advertising/signage specifies that it is free.

- Have the vendor fair be more of a festival/party atmosphere. Have activities that college students like to do (disc golf, games, hacky-sack, ribbon dancing).
- Have events and workshop in the learning garden.
