- Whenever you quote from a text, introduce the quotation with a tag phrase that includes a
 textual verb as these to that exemplifies what the author of the passage wants to impart to
 the reader. Read the quote and choose the best verb.
- Beware the subtle differences of meanings of words and don't repeat the same verb/word in two close sentences. Key Shift + F7 to use the Thesaurus in MS Word for alternate words.
